From the Rabbi...

I have felt the shift in weather already, where shorts replace pants and sundresses billow in the wind. I have needed this heat for a while for my bones and my mind. With summer comes the opening of new books to read by the pool or in the park or on the deck.

Here are some wonderful new Jewish books to enjoy. The reviews come from the New York Times and the Jewish Book review. They are all books that I have read and loved or found very interested.

1) "Atomic Anna" by Rachael Berenbaum

In 1986, renowned nuclear scientist, Anna Berkova, is sleeping in her bed in the Soviet Union when Chernobyl's reactor melts down. It's the exact moment she tears through time—and it's an accident. When she opens her eyes, she's landed in 1992 only to discover Molly, her estranged daughter, shot in the chest. Molly, with her dying breath, begs Anna to go back in time and stop the disaster, to save Molly's daughter Raisa, and put their family's future on a better path.

In '60s Philadelphia, Molly is coming of age as an adopted refusenik. Her family is full of secrets and a past they won't share. She finds solace in comic books, drawing her own series, Atomic Anna, and she's determined to make it as an artist. When she meets the volatile, charismatic Viktor, their romance sets her life on a very different course.

In the '80s, Raisa, is a lonely teen and math prodigy, until a quiet, handsome boy moves in across the street and an odd old woman shows up claiming to be her biological grandmother. As Raisa finds new issues of Atomic Anna in unexpected places, she notices each comic challenges her to solve equations leading to one impossible conclusion: time travel. And she finally understands what she has to do.

As these remarkable women work together to prevent the greatest nuclear disaster of the 20th century, they grapple with the power their discoveries hold. Just because you can change the past, does it mean you should?

Not the type of book that I would normally read, but the author sent it to me for a review. I ended up loving it. It is thought provoking, engaging and about relationships from one generation to the next.

2) "The Hidden Palace: A Novel of the Golem and the Jinni"

Pleasanton resident Helene Wecker has written a highly anticipated sequel to her successful 2013 debut novel, "The Golem and the Jinni," and it's just as magical. Chava is a golem, a woman made of clay, who can hear the thoughts and longings of those around her and feels compelled by her nature to help them. Ahmad is a jinni, a restless creature of fire, once free to roam the desert but now imprisoned in the shape of a man. Chava and Ahmad both try to pass as human in 1900s Manhattan, but they impact the actual humans around them. This book includes two new characters — an heiress, Sophia, who searches for a cure to her mysterious illness and travels to the Middle East and meets a jinni, and Kreindel, a young Jewish girl on the Lower East Side who builds a golem, Yossele, with her rabbi father. Jewish folklore, romance and a golem make this book a great read.

I loved the Jini and the Golem. It is one of my favorite books so when I heard that Helene Wecker, wrote the Hidden Palace, I pre-ordered the book and devoured it. It was just as well written as the first and the story is fabulous. Of course, it made me think of Angels, life after death and human purpose. Very thoughtful!

3) "Life on the Line: Young Doctors Come of Age in a Pandemic"

This book is the eye-opening story of six young doctors who were on the front lines of the Covid-19 pandemic in New York City, all of whom graduated early from med school to go work.

Goldberg expertly tells the story of the six new doctors — Sam, Gabriela, Iris, Elana, Jay and Ben — after having spent extensive time with them, their families and loved ones. What results is an emotional portrait of what working as a new doctor during the pandemic felt like, and it's hard to put down.

Two of the doctors are Jewish, and their stories were particularly powerful as a Jewish reader. Sam, a gay Jewish man, is shaped by the legacy of AIDS — he met his partner, Jeremy, marching in a New York City AIDS walk for their synagogue, Beit Simchat Torah, a queer congregation.

*And Elana is moved by the Jewish value of **pikuach nefesh** (saving a life). Her first Friday working in a Covid ward, she realizes she would not make it home before sundown. "As the sky outside the hospital darkened, Elana had to keep repeating to herself: Saving a life trumps the Sabbath," Goldberg writes.*

Each of the stories of the six doctors she follows are heartbreaking and powerful and inspiring, and Goldberg also works in the history of the American medical system and the homogeneity of America's doctors (and what that means for patients).

This book came to me through my mother's friend who is a pastor. She always sends me the most unusual books or thoughtful tomes of poetry. Her note with the book, "You will be inspired. Read with tissues and pens." As I began to read, I took out highlighters of every color and highlight lines and phrases for the High Holidays. This book is about life and death, saving souls and letting those go in the heart of the pandemic. I loved some of the doctors and really hated one (for me to feel true hatred for another, especially in the midst of a book is unusual). I reached out to him after I finished the book to begin a discussion that continues through today. This book will definitely be part of my High Holiday sermons, so please read it!!!!

4) "Something Wild"

Hanna Halperin's debut novel is the story of sisters Tanya and Nessa Bloom, who return to their childhood home in the Boston suburbs to help their mother move out. As they do, they realize their mother is in an abusive relationship with their stepfather, and Tanya tries to urge her to get a restraining order.

However, Nessa's response to the abuse brings back a traumatic moment in the Bloom sisters' childhood and the wide-ranging impact it had on them in the present.

The Blooms are an interfaith Catholic Jewish family, and Tanya, who married a Jewish man, is struggling with her Jewish identity.

I just love how this book is described in one blurb I saw online: "A magnetic, unflinching portrait of the bond between sisters, as well as a psychologically acute exploration of the legacy of divorce, the ways trauma reverberates over generations, and how it might be possible to overcome the past."

A host of other Jewish books of note are arriving this month, so here's a quick rundown.

"The Netanyahu's" - by Jewish novelist Joshua Cohen, is the story of one disastrous night 60 years ago when Benzion Netanyahu, a historian and the father of Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, interviews for a teaching position at a fictional college in upstate New York. The book is subtitled "An Account of a Minor and Ultimately Even Negligible Episode in the History of a Very Famous Family."

"SPIN: A Novel Based on a (Mostly) True Story" - is the tale of Annie Londonderry, the Jewish woman who became the first woman to cycle around the world. It's written by Jewish author Peter Zheutlin, a descendant of Annie.

"Cultish: The Language of Fanaticism" - is a fascinating look at cults by Jewish linguist Amanda Montell. It doesn't dive into any Jewish cults, but Montell dives into the spectrum of cults, from Jonestown to Instagram influencers.

"Everyone Knows Your Mother Is a Witch" - is a historical fiction novel from Jewish author Rivka Galchen. It's about Katharina Kepler, the mother of astronomer Johannes Kepler.

"The Child in the Electric Chair" - is a posthumous book by Jewish professor Eli Faber. Subtitled "The Execution of George Junius Stinney Jr. and the Making of a Tragedy in the American South," it tells the tale of a Black 14-year-old boy executed in South Carolina after a trial that only lasted a few hours.

"Bodies Are Cool" - is a delightful children's book about bodies by Jewish illustrator Tyler Feder.

"Ethel Rosenberg: An American Tragedy" - is the story of the Jewish woman who was convicted as a spy and executed in 1953. It's written by Anne Sebba.

"The Vixen" - uses the Rosenbergs' execution as a jumping off point to tell the story of a young Jewish editor dealing with editing a terrible anti-communist novel that sensationalizes their exploits in the U.S. It's written by Francine Prose.

"The Storm is Upon Us" - is Jewish author Mike Rothschild's deep dive into QAnon, including how QAnon is a deeply antisemitic movement. The book is subtitled "How QAnon Became a Movement, Cult, and Conspiracy Theory of Everything."

"Wolf Lamb Bomb" - is a debut poetry collection from Jewish writer Aviya Kushner. The collection reimagines the Book of Isaiah in an intimate conversation between woman and prophet.

"The Engagement" - by Sasha Issenberg is subtitled "America's Quarter-Century Struggle Over Same-Sex Marriage." It chronicles the 25 years leading up to the 2015 Supreme Court ruling legalizing gay marriage.

Enjoy your summer. In Judaism, education never stops. Get ready for our pamphlet of learning opportunities which will arrive in August when classes for adults begin.

Cantor's Corner...



Notes from the Cantor

War torn Ukraine. The images of destruction and fear for its survival weigh heavily on our minds. Many of us can trace some part of our ancestry there and friends and colleagues of mine have loved ones who recently fled the invasion. It is also in Ukraine among other places where many of the great seeds in our vast treasure garden of Jewish music were planted.

Approximately 100 years ago two creative Jews met in Odessa and wrote a song to welcome Shabbat. Their names were Chaim Nachman Bialik and Pinchas Minkowsky. Volhynian born Bialik was one of the pioneers of modern Hebrew poetry, as well as an essayist, translator and founder of an intellectual movement. Pinchos Minkowsky from Belaya Tserkov, Ukraine was a prominent Cantor and Composer. It was during Minkowsky's tenure at Odessa's Brodsky Synagogue that an organ and a mixed gender choir were regularly included in the services. The lasting collaboration of these two Ukrainian Jewish men can be found at the bottom of page 128 in Mishkan Tefilah Listen to a beautiful choral arrangement here: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZrTEZeDfdy8>

Let us rewind further back to the 18th Century, when Ukrainian Hasidic Rabbi Levi Yitzchak of Berdichev filed a liturgical lawsuit against the Almighty, confronting God with a Kaddish of protest during a Rosh HaShanah service, asking God to account for the suffering of the Jewish people. This special prayer of protest and complaint became known in Yiddish as "A Din Toire Mit Gott" ("A Court session with God.") This inspired many folk song renderings including this version sung by Jan Peerce: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=I3I-_ZzdFw4. Also, there is this English version sung by Paul Robeson: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Q9Fn1cbNcqk>. Then, in 1963, Leonard Bernstein expanded upon the concept with a Kaddish Symphony concerned not just for the Jewish people but for the future of mankind. The backdrop is a destroyed world and one of the last survivors of humanity reaches out to God with the chilling declaration, "I want to say Kaddish for there may be no one to say it after me." Many are fond of a Yiddish song called "Bay Mir Bistu Sheyn" which the legendary composer Sholom Secunda wrote for an early 1930s Yiddish musical called Esterke. Let us not forget that it was in the Kherson region of Ukraine that Secunda was born in 1894. It was the area that we know today as Lviv which

produced the Broder sisters, one of the few precursors to Yiddish theater. It was in Odessa where Avraham Goldfaden conceived of the medium that would become Yiddish Theater, and also where Alexander Olshanetsky honed his craft.

It was Ukraine which produced Jewish Art Composers such as Lazare Saminsky, Lazar Weiner, Jacob Weinberg, Leo Ornstein, and also Cantors such as Josef (Yossele) Rosenblatt.

Pray for peace in Ukraine.

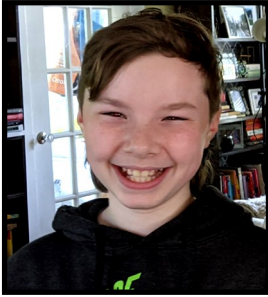

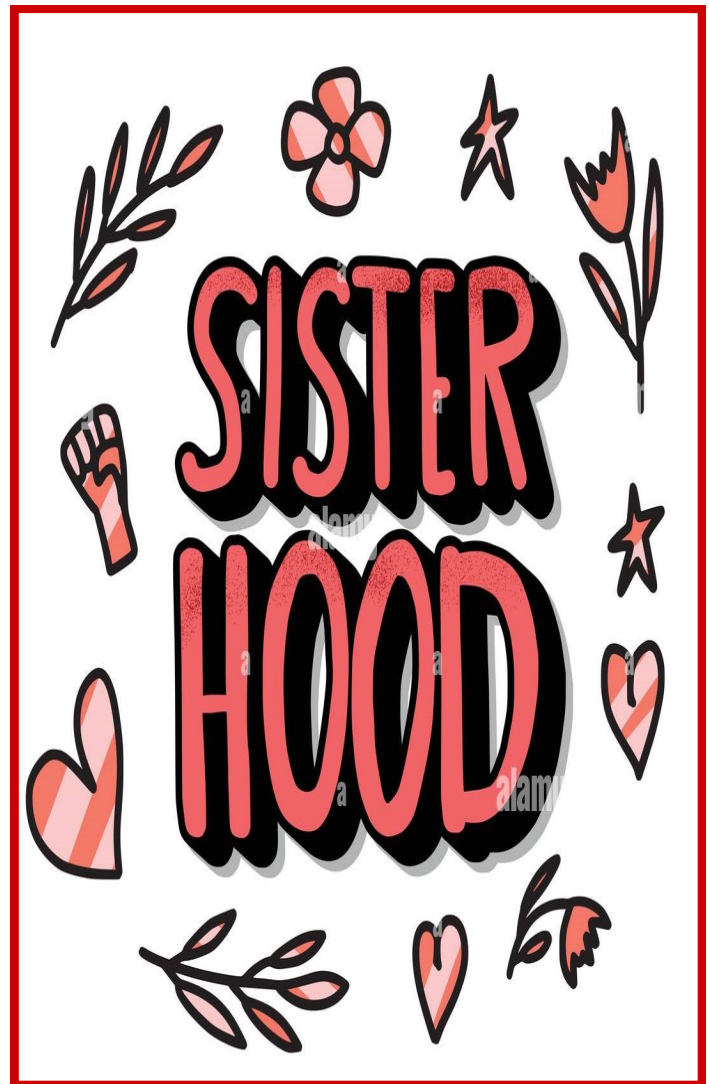

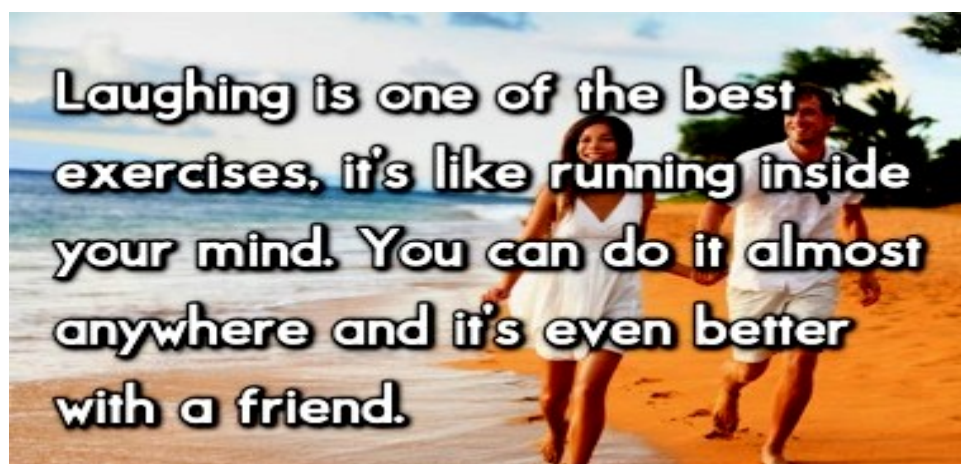
