Cantor's Corner...

 \mathsection Notes From the Cantor \mathsection

Towards the end of this month, the Jewish calendar gives us two special events back to back which always concur during the same week. They are TU B'Shevat and Shabbat Shirah. "TU B'Shevat" literally means the "15th day of the month of Shevat." Here is a quick explanation for how the syllable TU came to signify the number 15. Some of you may already know this but let's review. The letter Tet equals 9 in numerology and the letter Vav equals 6. Most numbers in the teens would start with the letter Yud. However, in the case of the number 15, expressing it as 10 + 5 would give us a Yud and a Hey which would form part of the Ineffable Name of God. Therefore, we express 15 as TU (9+6). The 15th of Shevat is considered the New Year for the Trees.

There are four different New Years in Jewish tradition on the yearly calendar. They are:

1) Rosh Hashanah marking the first day of humanity,

2) the first of Nisan which is called in Exodus 12,

Exodus, a new beginning for the newly freed Jewish people,

- 3) TU B'Shevat, our holiday coming up known as the New Year for the Trees, or Jewish Earth Day, or Jewish Arbor Day,
- 4) the first of Elul, the beginning of the penitential season. It is also considered to be the New Year of Animals.

So, how did the 15th of Shevat get designated as the New Year of the trees? In tractate Rosh Hashanah is where the Four New Years get mentioned. The House of Shammai wanted the trees' new year to be on the first of Shevat, but the House of Hillel wanted it to be on the 15th. Hillel usually won those debates. It was important to demarcate a date around which the laws for the ancient tithing of fruits took place in the land of Israel. In several places in the Torah, trees are seen as metaphorical representations of humanity, and also the Torah itself. So celebrating trees celebrates our spiritual growth as individuals, and also the fruit bearing branches of Torah learning. Customs all involve trees.

One of the most popular customs is the TU B'Shevat Seder. Seder means "order" and one of the similarities between the TU B'Shevat Seder and the Passover Seder is the four cups of wine. However, in the Seder for TU B'Shevat, each cup of wine or grape juice must have a different ratio between white and red so that

your cup gradually goes from the white of winter to the red of spring and summer. Also included at the TU B'Shevat seder are the seven species of produce mentioned in Deuteronomy 8:8. They are: wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates.

In the same week as TU B'Shevat, on Shabbat is always Shabbat Shirah when we come to the Song at the Sea during the incredible narrative of the parting of the Sea of Reeds. The song that Moses, Miriam, and the Israelites sing is presented in the Torah scroll in brick formation. In Hebrew, the word for both stanza and building is "binyan." The week celebrates both planting and building.

Also, just as plants and trees receive water, Music and Torah are both seen as water for the soul. Shabbat Shirah becomes a celebration of Jewish Music.

From the President...

To My Temple Family,

In my Rosh Hashana comments I spoke about the work completed by some of our congregants for the High Holidays, and requested that you consider assisting our efforts moving forward. Many of you have done just that by offering suggestions for programming, and offering to serve on committees. As a result, we now have twelve committees at work, in addition to the Board of Trustees, actively engaged in supporting our community. To date, twenty-seven congregants are serving our community, which is approximately thirty per cent of our congregation. This may be the highest percentage of congregant involvement in many years. I believe we can be proud of ourselves, and know that we are actively working together to support our Jewish community known as Temple Sha'arey Shalom. This level of commitment will continue as necessary as we attempt to continue forward and survive as a congregation.

The recent Chanukah Brunch was a success! Though the Cantor was not able to join us due to having covid, we ate, shmoozed, and enjoyed a discussion concerning the Israel-Hamas War led by our Rabbi Emeritus Josh Goldstein. On behalf of all who attended I extend our appreciation to the Activities Committee members and other congregants who assisted with the program: Ron & Laura Weening, Mara Friedman, Dayle Treece, Amy Kass, Sue Marcus, Doreen Salerno, and Edie Ben-Israel.

The Rabbi Search Committee has continued its work and recently interviewed a potential candidate, began checking references, and is in the process of planning the next steps in the process leading to, what appears to be, the successful completion of the search process. The Rabbi Search Committee will share more information with us, as the committee completes its planning.

The Social Action Committee co-chaired by Richard Brown and Edie Ben-Israel are researching and planning activities that will allow members of TSS to be involved in socially meaningful projects. As they develop activities/programs for us, they will offer

those opportunities to us.

As you know the frequency of antisemitic behaviors both nationally and locally has continued to increase. There have been a number of bomb threats made to synagogues and other Jewish agencies in New Jersey within the past week. Fortunately, those threats have proven to been false. The most recent Security Updates I have received indicate that the bomb threats have been made via emails to synagogue offices, therefore, I have instructed TSS office staff, should such a threat arrive in our email, to immediately notify the Springfield Police, shelter in place until the police arrive and provide direction to us.

As an update from Adira (our granddaughter in Israel) who has reported several trips to bomb shelters, being out in an open field when sirens went off, and no bomb shelter hence, she and friends laid down on the ground. They watched one rocket fly overhead, no damage and all are well. Adira also shared photos of rockets flying across the sky as well as pictures and videos taken in the bomb shelters. The videos were interesting in that the people therein joined each other in song as a way of dealing with the stress of the situation. Overall, Adira feels safe and is actively involved in her study program, which has included time volunteering with displaced school age children, serving as a teacher's aide, working in a fig grove, and generally being involved in Israeli life post October 7. When time permits Adira has visited with her Israeli family. Even in stressful times, we adapt and live our lives.

The 15th of Shevat is the New Year for Trees, known as *Tu b'Shevat*.

According to Biblical law, there is a seven year agricultural cycle, concluding with the Sabbatical year. When the Holy Temple stood in Jerusalem, on years one, two, four and five of this cycle, farmers were required to separate a tenth of their produce and eat it in <u>Jerusalem</u>. This tithe is called Maaser Sheni, the Second Tithe, because it is in addition to the (two percent which must be given to the Kohain, and the) ten percent which is given to the Levite. On the third and sixth years of the cycle, instead of the owners eating the <u>Maaser Sheni</u> in Jerusalem, they gave this second tithe to the poor, who were permitted to consume it wherever they wished.

It takes approximately four months for the rains of the new year to saturate the soil and trees, and produce fruit[On the Sabbatical year, no tithes are separated. All produce which grows during this year is ownerless and free for anyone to take.]

It was therefore of vital importance to ascertain when the new year started for produce. Our Rabbis established that a fruit which blossomed before the 15th of Shevat is produce of the previous year. If it blossomed afterwards, it is produce of the "new year." [By comparison, grains, vegetables, and legumes have the same New Year as humans, the 1st of Tishrei.] Why is this so? In the Mediterranean region, the rainy season begins with the festival of Sukkot. It takes approximately four months (from Sukkot, the 15th of Tishrei, until the 15th of Shevat) for the rains of the new year to saturate the soil and trees, and produce fruit. All fruit which blossom beforehand are a product of the rains of the previous year, and are tithed together with the crops of the previous year.

Although this day is Rosh Hashanah for *trees*, we attach special significance to this holiday because "Man is [compared to] the tree of the field" ($\underline{\text{Deuteronomy 20:19}}$). Through cultivating strong roots – faith and commitment to $G \Box d$ – we produce many fruits—Torah and Mitzvot.

Observances and Customs

On this day it is customary to partake of the fruit with which the Holy Land is praised (Deuteronomy 8:8): olives, dates, grapes, figs and pomegranates. If tasting any of these fruit for the first time this season, remember to recite the *Shehecheyanu* blessing. (A blessing recited on joyous occasions, thanking Gold for "sustaining us and enabling us to reach this occasion." This blessing is recited before the standard "*Ha'etz*" blessing recited on fruit.)

Due to the festive nature of the day, we omit the *Tachanun* sections (petitions for forgiveness and confession) from the prayers.
