From the Rabbi...

'A letter to the editor in the New York Times' in 1988 relates the following story:

Isidor I. Rabi, the Nobel laureate in physics...was once asked, "Why did you become a scientist, rather than a doctor or lawyer or businessman, like the other immigrant kids in your neighborhood?"... Dr. Rabi's answer...was profound: "My mother made me a scientist without ever intending it. Every other Jewish mother in Brooklyn would ask her child after school: 'So nu? Did you learn anything today?' But not my mother. She always asked me a different question. 'Izzy,' she would say, 'did you ask a good question today?' That difference - asking good questions - made me become a scientist!"

I am reminded of this story every year when Pesach rolls around because as we know, our Passover traditions - indeed the seder itself - are activated and animated by questions. Mah nishtanah halayla ha zeh mikol haleilot? — What makes this night different from all other nights? The questions of the Four Children. Even our own curiosities about Passover and the Exodus.

Questions invite people into conversation. When we ask them we demonstrate curiosity and interest

in another person or an area of study. Being inquisitive communicates an openness that we don't know everything and that we are prepared to learn.

In that light, the seder meal is really a ritual of education designed to

elicit as many questions as possible, to notice all of the differences of this night as opposed to other nights so that we can accomplish our desired learning outcome as described by the haggadah itself: Bechol Dor vador Chayav adam lirot et atzmo ke-ilu hu yatza mimitzrayim. In every generation, each person must see themselves as having personally left Egypt. In other words the goal of this educational exercise is not only to tell a story of freedom, but to experience freedom.

This combination of education and freedom rang a bell from my studies in education at the Hartman Institute. There I was exposed to a thinker named Paolo Freire, a 20th century Brazilian educator and philosopher. His most famous work is called 'Pedagogy of the Oppressed'. There he shows how educational systems can and have been used as a tool of oppression and he recommends an alternate mode of teaching that serves to liberate the students instead.

I would like to bring 2 ideas from Freire here. The first relates to freedom itself and the second to the and relationship between teacher student. Regarding freedom Freire writes "Freedom is acquired by conquest, not by gift. It must be pursued constantly and responsibly. Freedom is not an ideal located outside of man; nor is it an idea which becomes myth. It is rather the indispensable condition for the quest for human completion". In other words freedom is not a status that one achieves once and is everlasting. Rather freedom is the ongoing activity of seeking to be our best selves, of questioning the world around us in service of deeper understanding and the striving for the proper functioning of the world through acts of justice and righteousness. In this model the questioner, and not the one with the answer, is the freest.

This is the basis for his next idea regarding the relationship between teacher and student. He rejects what he calls the 'banking' approach to teaching. In that model the student is considered an empty bank account in which the teacher makes regular deposits. The student is simply a vessel to be a container for whatever is placed inside. According to Freire, this can result in both the teacher and the student being dehumanized — that is each one is simply a receptacle of knowledge and nothing more. Instead he suggests an educational stance that views the student — all people really — not as empty vessels waiting to be filled but as incomplete beings seeking to be whole.

Considering the Passover meal in light of Freire then, we discover that the seder is an educational tool designed to activate human striving towards completion through asking and answering questions — as only free people can - AND by putting the emphasis on the question as opposed to the answer, we might view human potential in expansive terms as opposed to limiting ones. To put it another way, education is freeing not because it gives you information but because it teaches you how to question.

So it turns out that Izidor Rabi's mother was right. It's not about the answers and what you learned — it's about the questions and how you learned. So I pose the question to us all in preparation for our sedarim — What will we do differently this year to illicit questions? What will be the provocation at our sedarim that activates a process of becoming free through active inquiry? How will a conversation about our historic liberation lead us to activate our contemporary freedoms and perhaps even bring closer the time of a future redemption as well.

Wishing us all a Chag Kasher Vesameach!

Cantor's Corner...



& Notes From the Cantor &

It's late at night. Guests are truly reclining at your Passover Seder. You've made it through almost the entire Seder after three and a half or maybe four cups or sips of wine or

grape juice. Some of your guests may have already switched to coffee in preparation for the drive home, but you managed to convince everyone to return to the haggadot after the meal to do a conclusion to the Seder. Between Hallel, Birkat HaMazon, and the close of the Seder, the second half of the Seder involves a lot more singing than the first. At the end of whichever haggadah you are using, is likely an array of seemingly whimsical songs in Hebrew, Aramaic, or English, all with many verses that may or may not be part of your family's minhag to sing. There is Chad Gadya in which God smites the Angel of Death who slew the ox that drank the water that guenched the fire that burnt the stick that beat the dog that bit the cat that ate the goat my father bought for two zuzim, all in similar format to a lovely ditty about an old lady who swallowed a fly. (Don't ask me why.) Then there is the Beit HaMikdash oriented song Adir Hu, to which the Reform movement offered the alternative song "God of Might" for those of us who relish the famous melody but whose Judaism does not solely focus on one geographical spot on Earth. There is also a numbers song, assigning each number from one to thirteen, to an aspect of Jewish life, Jewish learning, and Jewish thought. This song is called "Echad Mi Yodeia" in Hebrew and Aramaic. In English, it is called, "Who Knows One?" In Ladino it is called "Quen Su Piese" or "Ken Supiense" or "Ken Supiese."

Ladino, also known as Judeo Espagnole, originated as Castilian Spanish, and followed the Jewish people to places like Turkey, Morocco, Bosnia, Salonika, Greece, the island of Rhodes and eventually Israel after the expulsion in 1492. It is a Romance language enriched by the Semitic influences of Hebrew, Aramaic, Arabic, and Ottoman Turkish. Today it is spoken as a minority language in Israel, Turkey, and a few other countries.

There are many different Ladino versions with slightly different wordings, different pronunciations, and variations to the melody of Quen Su Piese. It appears in very few Sephardic Haggadot but communities have passed it down orally, thus multiplying the different interpretations in different Sephardic communities. Some versions include a rhyming pre-amble half in Hebrew, half in Ladino about making a pilgrimage to Jerusalem in a great caravan. While many associate the number thirteen with the

attributes of Divine Mercy, there is a version that equates the number thirteen with the twelve brothers plus their sister, Dina. Still another version equates thirteen with Maimonides' Principles of Faith. While the Hebrew text to Echad Mi Yode'a equates two with the tablets of the covenant, most Sephardic communities replaced that reference opting instead to use two to give kavod to "Moshe y Aron," the two brothers at the center of the Exodus narrative. In all of the versions, one is always God, five are always the books of Torah, and three is usually Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and four is usually Sarah, Rebeccah, Leah, and Rachel.

Here is a version of the song. I am not sure which version it is.






