### From the Rabbi...

You did it! During the last few months the elections for the World Zionist Congress took place. So many of you voted for (mostly for the Reform slate) along with tens of thousands of Jews around the world. These elections are vitally important to supporting the vision of Israel as a Jewish and democratic state, and to ensuring that Israel represents our diverse worldwide Jewry.

What is the World Jewish Congress?

The World Zionist Congress, first convened by Theodor Herzl in 1897, is the democratic legislative body of the World Zionist Organization and one of the most significant gatherings in modern Jewish history. Meeting approximately every five years, the Congress brings together elected delegates from Jewish communities around the world including Israel - to discuss and shape the future of the Zionist movement. It sets policy, elects leadership, and oversees major institutions like the Jewish Agency for Israel, Keren Kayemet LeYisrael (JNF), and Keren Hayesod. The Congress plays a vital role in

determining funding priorities for Jewish education, aliyah, religious life, and Israel-diaspora relations. Uniquely, it is one of the few global platforms where Jews of diverse ideologies

Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, and secular - can come together to debate, collaborate, and influence the direction of Jewish life and the State of Israel. It is a powerful reminder that the dream of Zionism is not only historic - it is still evolving, and we all have a voice in shaping its future.

In essence it is the parliament of the Jewish people that sits in parallel and in cooperation with the Israeli Kenesset.

As a Reform congregation, our interest in this important conversation primarily focuses on ensuring a vibrant Reform/progressive Jewish life in Israel. As one of the largest (perhaps the largest) movements representing Jews in Diaspora, our participation in the lives of Israeli Jews is of great importance. It's true that we often say *ki mitziyon taytsay Torah - Torah goes forth from Zion*, but in our interconnected modern world, Jewish life outside of Israel can be attractive and even inspirational to Israeli Jews. As we know the division between 'religious' and 'secular' in Israel is too blunt of a description to be useful.

Israelis are seeking spiritual and authentic Jewish nourishment. The Reform movement is uniquely positioned to bring this approach to the masses thereby connecting more people to their Judaism and building Jewish identity.

What is the platform of the Movement in the WZC elections?

The Reform Movement's platform for the World

Zionist Congress (WZC) elections, represented by the "Vote Reform" slate, reflects a strong commitment to a democratic, pluralistic, and inclusive vision for the State of Israel. As the largest Zionist movement in the U.S., the Reform Movement advocates for Israel to embody the values of its Declaration of Independence ensuring equality for all citizens and full religious pluralism. The platform promotes egual recognition and funding for all streams of Judaism, including Reform and Conservative, and supports policies that advance social justice, gender equality, and peace. It also emphasizes the importance of a strong Israel-Diaspora relationship and a collective stand against antisemitism and anti-Zionism. By voting for "Vote Reform," members of the Reform community help shape the priorities and funding of major Zionist institutions to reflect values of inclusion, democracy, and shared Jewish destiny.

So I say to you, Todah Rabbah! Thank you for your commitment to these values and to lending your voice. Hopefully the vote will come out positively so that much needed funds can be directed towards these efforts. As we all know, there is more than one way to be Jewish. Your participation in these elections are a meaningful step in promoting this idea and bringing it to reality.

## Cantor's Corner...



### 🐇 Notes From the Cantor 🐇

"The Lord is my engineer.
The Lord is the earth I ride on.
The Lord is the face in the atmosphere,

The path I slip and slide on.
The Lord is a virgin forest
The Lord is a forest ranger
The Lord is a meal for the poorest of the poor
A welcome door to the stranger"
—-Paul Simon

The above lyrics get reprised with some variation by the legendary artist Paul Simon in the album that he released about two years ago called, <u>Seven Psalms</u>. The album is about 33 minutes long and is his fifteenth solo studio album. It is a contemplative album with mostly acoustic guitar playing, and also features the voice of Edie Brickell, his wife, as well as Voces8.

The Biblical book of Psalms, called "Tehillim" in Hebrew, is a compilation of 150 prayer poems attributed to King David and others. We recite various samples of them on Shabbat, Holidays, and many different occasions, happy and sad alike. These inspired Paul Simon to write seven modern ones set to music. He says that the idea came to him in a dream, one that specifically came to him on January 15, 2019, in which he clearly received a message that he was supposed to be working on seven psalms. He has recounted that the lyrics came to him between 3:30 and 5:00 AM several mornings in a row. Like in the Biblical book, Simon describes God using several metaphors such as "the path that I slip and slide on." Long time fans of his might recognize the "slipping and sliding" from an older Paul Simon song. In another, harsher lyric, he equates God with the Covid virus.

Unlike the 150 Biblical Psalms, Paul Simon's Seven Psalms are titled. He respectively calls them: "The Lord", "Love is Like a Braid", "My Professional

Opinion", "Your Forgiveness", "Trail of Volcanoes", "The Sacred Harp", and "Wait." In one of them, he pays a tribute to King David. "The sacred harp," writes Simon, "that David played to make his songs of praise, we long to hear those strings that set his heart ablaze."

While Seven Psalms is certainly a spiritual work, it doesn't seem like Paul Simon has intended it to be exclusively for Jews. Simon for most of his life has seemed to identify more as a secular, cultural Jew. Yet many Jewish fans of his have certainly found Jewish spirituality in the work, as well as consolation and comfort in a post-10/7 world, though it was written before 10/7. Mallory Mosner, writing for the Havurah Journal stated, "This album has set my heart ablaze. It has not only provided space for daily meditation, solace, and reflection during this overwhelmingly terrifying but it has reinforced to me the transcendental power and beauty of Jewish artperhaps even touching on the secret chord."

# From the Co-Presidents...

#### Contagion

If you've been paying attention to emails that the Temple sends out (and I certainly hope you are) you've noticed that our Social Action Committee has been active on a number of fronts. Richard and Edythe have instituted or pointed us in the direction of activities that are meant to improve the world on both humanitarian and civic fronts. I'm not going to set out which of these areas of concern is more important. They both are! For the purposes of this column, let's focus on the civic aspect.

As a non-profit religious organization we should not endanger that status by taking political sides, even if our individual congregants have strong political opinions. That may seem like I'm splitting hairs, but it has an unseen benefit. Ad-hominem attacks in disagreements can become a real distraction from finding constructive action to better ourselves, our Temple and the wider world around us. On the micro level, you can probably recall times when arguments about a stance someone took in your personal or Temple life caused you to get angry and further caused you to take it out on the person rather than seek solutions to a situation they advocated that ticked you off. Coming to an acceptable resolution for the two of you was probably delayed by one of you (or maybe both) attacking the other, and not the problem. In the heat of the moment, it may feel cathartic to blow off steam directed at the offender and not the offense. We're human....it's hard to separate ourselves from our dismay towards an action and the person taking it. I've been guilty of it more than once.

When it comes to the macro situation in our civic lives, the same dynamic is at work. The internet (I'm especially looking at you, social media) has elevated and even monetized insults and bile. Where we used to honor people for being a mensch, it seems that the person with the hottest take and cruelest comments are getting the lion's share of societal recognition and admiration. It's a trap.

When focusing on attacking a person we deem as wrong-headed in any venue, we waste a lot of time being angry. It's easy to lose our heads, feel hopeless and give up. It's something meanspirited people count on, to get you off-balance. When we give up on finding solutions and just hurl insults, that attitude can spread like a disease. We lose our better selves. Hatred goes viral very easily. When we get laser-focused on the problem at hand, it clarifies our response. This can also spread, but it spreads like a cure being distributed to the sick. We'll continue to pitch you opportunities for individual and societal benefit.

Fear and loathing are powerful contagions. So is courage.



# Judaism in the Second Temple Period: From Persian Influence to Rabbinic Transformation Led by Dan Herman

## Tuesday Mornings 10:00 am -11:00 am

For the past three years, the "Tuesday Morning Study Group" has been studying the development of Judaism through the First Temple period utilizing the middle section of the Tanakh known as "The Prophets". Join Professor Dan Herman as we now transition our study of Jewish history with a course on "Judaism in the Second Temple Period." From the dawn of Persian rule in 539 BCE to the seismic shifts brought by the Roman conquest and the subsequent formation of Rabbinic Judaism, we will discuss how this formative era in Jewish history connects to contemporary Jewish thought and practice.

# Yom HaZikaron and Yom HaAtzmaut Israel Memorial Day and Independence Day




#### YOM HAZIKARON AND YOM HAATZMAUT'S ORIGINS

Since the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, four new holidays have been added to the Jewish calendar – Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day), Yom HaAtzmaut (Independence Day), and Yom Y'rushalayim (Jerusalem Day, which celebrates the reunification of the city in 1967). In Israel, these days are observed as national holidays; around the world, they are observed in various ways by Jewish communities.

The Israeli Knesset (parliament) established the day that precedes Yom HaAtzmaut as Yom HaZikaron, a day to memorialize soldiers who lost their lives fighting in the War of Independence and subsequent battles, as well as a day to remember civilian victims of terrorism. The official State name given to the day is Yom HaZikaron LeChalalei Maarachot Yisrael ul'Nifg'ei Peulot HaEivah (יוֹם הזִּכָּרוֹן לַחֲלָלֵי מַעֲרָכוֹת יִשְׂרָאֵל וּלְנִפְּגְעֵי (אַרְכוֹת הָאֵיבָה) which means "Memorial Day for the Fallen Soldiers of Israel and Victims of Terrorism" and was enacted into law in 1963.

Yom HaAtzmaut marks the anniversary of the establishment of the modern state of Israel. It is observed on or near the 5th of the Hebrew month of Iyar on the Jewish calendar, which usually falls in April.
