From the Rabbi...

This month, my oldest son is heading to Philadelphia on a class trip to celebrate the end of middle school. The itinerary includes a Phillies game, the Constitution Center, Independence Hall, and the Franklin Institute. It's a fun and meaningful way to mark a transition, and the students are excited for time together - out of the house and out of the classroom.

For those who don't know, he attends Golda Och Academy - known as Solomon Schechter when I was a student there myself.

As was the case when I was in school, every field trip begins with a reminder: **"You are representing yourself, your family, your school, and the Jewish people while you are on this trip. Please behave accordingly."**

It's a simple, powerful message that asks students to hold themselves to a higher standard—because they are part of

something bigger.

This year, though, that message carries added weight. As part of the preparations, the school ordered custom T-shirts for the trip. The news came just a day or two after the deadly shooting in Washington, D.C., where Sarah Milgrim and Yaron Lischinsky were killed. My first thought wasn't about design or color. It was: *Will these shirts mark them as a Jewish group? Will that make them a target? I wrote the school to share my concerns. Their response was compassionate and thoughtful - they assured me that they are acutely aware of the mood in our country and are taking every precaution.*

Still, that sinking feeling in my stomach has been hard to shake. The last time I felt it so strongly was after the Tree of Life shooting in Pittsburgh. That horrible Shabbat morning made clear that antisemitism is not just a thing of the past - it is present and dangerous.

In the last few months, those feelings have returned. Since Passover, to be specific. On the first night of seder, the home of Pennsylvania Governor Josh Shapiro was set on fire. Just weeks later, two Israeli embassy staffers were murdered at a Jewish event, at a Jewish institution. More recently, pro-Israel demonstrators were firebombed with molotov cocktails in Boulder Colorado.

The dread is back.

I've never quite felt this way before.

I grew up here in South Orange in the latter part

of the 20th century - a time that felt filled with pluralism and coexistence. Maybe I was naive, or maybe I lived in a bubble. But I didn't experience antisemitism growing up. We played in the street with our neighbors - four Protestant boys - and religion never entered the equation. We walked to shul proudly with kippot visible, often together with other Jews. Were we targets then too?

Now, everything feels different.

Of course I always knew there were antisemites out there. But I also believed - truly believed - that America was different. That this country had, in some important way, moved past the worst of that hatred. That we Jews were full participants in American society, not just tolerated but embraced.

It no longer feels that way.

We've seen the statistics. We can name the incidents. We feel the pain of victims just one or two degrees removed from us. And we feel, in our bones, the weight of a long, painful history. Perhaps you are having similar feelings?

And we respond. We strengthen our buildings. We upgrade our security systems. We talk to our children. We remain vigilant.

And we keep going - proudly Jewish, deeply American, holding both love and fear in our hearts. As ever, we represent not only ourselves, but our families, our schools, and the Jewish people.

Notes From the Cantor

We've sung his melody to Mi Chamocha many times over the years at Temple Sha'arey Shalom.

Jewish children here in Springfield and all across North America have at one time or another participated in the singing and clapping along to his rousing version of Etz Chaim-Tree of Life. Cantor Richard B. Silverman, Z"L, wrote over two hundred songs and left a profound impact on the music of our Reform Jewish liturgy.

Richard Silverman was born on January 12, 1942, the youngest of five children to Cantor Saul and Mollie Silverman in Los Angeles, CA. He obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from California State University, a Bachelor of Sacred Music Degree from Hebrew Union College, where he also obtained his Certificate in Chemical Dependence and Spiritual Counseling and a Master's in Clinical Psychology from John F. Kennedy University. He married his bride Batya on August 22, 1964, and they had two children, Sarit and Elan. In 2000, Cantor Silverman received his Honorary Doctorate Degree from Hebrew Union College. He served Stephen S. Wise Temple in Los Angeles from 1968-1976, Temple Isaiah of Lafayette from 1976-1988, and Temple Israel of Westport, CT, from 1988 on, where he also became the Cantor Emeritus and remained until his passing on May 26 of this year.

From the Co-Presidents...

As we conclude the 2024-25 year at Sha'arey Shalom, I thought I would share some information with you concerning the state of our congregation.

- Membership units: 56, which equals 93 individuals, 69 of whom live locally, of the latter congregants, 42 regularly attend TSS activities in person or on zoom
- The above data includes 1 new membership unit, and 3 returning TSS membership units for a total of 6 individuals
- We are a congregation of senior citizens with an age range of approximately 60 years to 90+ years, with a mean age of 78 years
- Currently our members reside in the states of Florida, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania
- Attendance during Shabbat Services has been consistent throughout the year with approximately 18 people in the sanctuary and approximately 7 people attending on zoom
- Activities offered by the Activities Committee, Ritual Committee, Social Action Committee, Sisterhood, and Brotherhood have been well attended. These committees have developed and presented more than 12 programs during the course of the year
- Rav Uri has offered an adult education course on a weekly schedule, and a once-a-month Nosh & Schmooze; Cantor Rosenman has offered a music appreciation course this spring; and Dan Herman, a congregant, has offered a once-a-week course that has addressed prophets, and Jewish history
- Additionally, the TSS Book club met on a monthly basis, and the Saturday Morning Minyan continued to meet weekly
- It appears that our small community has been actively engaged, and your involvement suggests that we are able to address your interests and needs

To those of you who planned and implemented these activities, we extend our appreciation for your commitment to our family. Each of you are a light to our community.

As we move forward into the 2025-26 Fiscal Year, please know that the synagogue leadership plans to continue to offer and expand upon the array of activities and services we have offered this past year. In so doing we will need your support and engagement in the life of our community. Please consider assisting with the development and implementation of an activity, offer suggestions of other activities or services you feel would be of interest to you.

We urge you to monitor TSS Happenings for the summer Shabbat Services schedule and leaders, information from the Social Action Committee, and other information.

On behalf of the Officers and Board of Trustees, we wish you an enjoyable, healthy, and safe summer.

Judaism in the Second Temple Period: From Persian Influence to Rabbinic Transformation Led by Dan Herman

Tuesday Mornings 10:00 am -11:00 am

For the past three years, the "Tuesday Morning Study Group" has been studying the development of Judaism through the First Temple period utilizing the middle section of the Tanakh known as "The Prophets". Join Professor Dan Herman as we now transition our study of Jewish history with a course on "Judaism in the Second Temple Period." From the dawn of Persian rule in 539 BCE to the seismic shifts brought by the Roman conquest and the subsequent formation of Rabbinic Judaism, we will discuss how this formative era in Jewish history connects to contemporary Jewish thought and practice.

Topics will include:

Persians and Greeks in Judea (539-168 BCE)

How the political and cultural tides of the Persian and Greek empires intertwined with Jewish religious practices and identities

Maccabean (Hasmonean) Rule (168-63 BCE)

How this period redefined Jewish autonomy and religious practice, setting the stage for a renewed Jewish identity

The Jews and Rome: Destruction of the Second Temple (63 BCE - 70 CE)

How the destruction of the Second Temple and the fall of Jerusalem catalyzed a radical transformation in Jewish thought and practice

The Beginnings of Rabbinic Judaism to 300 CE

How this pivotal period influenced Judaism and the lessons we can draw for today's Jewish community .

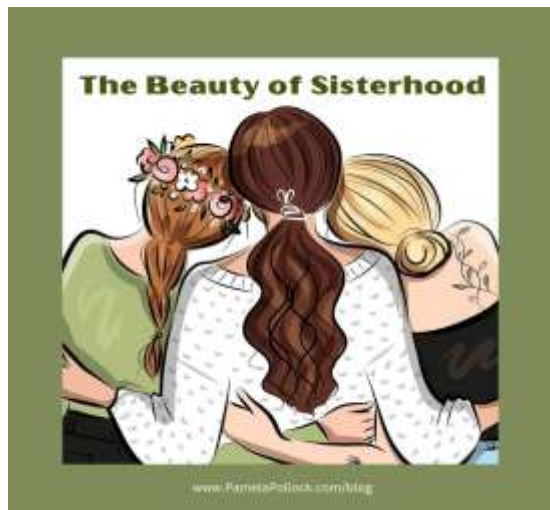


To my dear TSS friends and family,
