From the Rabbi...

Ready? Set? Go!

Here we go Temple Sha'arey Shalom. We have been here before, on the cusp on the High Holy Days, with its promise of return and renewal. It is a busy season. Several holidays that follow so close to one another can be a grind. So much cooking, so many meals, and certainly so much eating! But there is another aspect of all of these moments that invites something else.

When we observe the spiritual narrative stretching from the month of Elul (which is right now), to Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, followed by Sukkot and Simchat Torah, we can see an arc that invites us to a personal, spiritual, and communal experience. Let's take a quick overview of the flow of things.

First we have Elul, a month of preparation

and scratching the surface of our own lives. We ask ourselves, how was our year? Where were my successes and where were my growth areas? Are there relationships I need to

repair and heal?

Are the individuals I have wronged that I can make right? Have I been kind to myself this year? It is a time to prepare and to start the process of spiritual awakening.

Rosh HaShanah comes in the middle of that process of Teshuva. We crown God the Sovereign of the universe and begin in earnest the work of repentance. The beginning of Ten days of repentance culminate in Yom Kippur - the holiest and happiest (yes happiest) day of the Jewish calendar. We confess our misdeed, beat our chests, fast, and pray. These are designed to elevate our spiritual experience by wiping away all of things that keep us connected to our physical lives. This pairing of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur bookend an intense period of time that reminds us that repair is possible at this time of the year and anytime as well.

Sukkot then follows. Charged with the potency of the High Holy Days, we exit the safety and comfort of our homes to dwell in our temporary huts. We experience the true frailty of our existence and trust in God that despite the flimsy nature of our sukkah, we are protected and safe in God's shelterimg presence. And to close the season we complete the reading of the Torah and begin

again from the beginning.

I want to invite you to experience the fullness of this story with us. Yes, many people tend to come on the 3 days of the High Holy Days, but there is so much more to experience. My sense is that you will get so much out of it. You will help build and strengthen our community, receive spiritual uplift, and contribute to the holy energy we emit into the world. Join us. We want your spirit, your voice and your presence.

Cantor's Corner...



Motes From the Cantor London Bridge is Rising Back Up

From Mt. Sinai, a children's tune reverses itself to call us to return.. Throughout history, musicians,

songwriters, and rock bands have been accused by the fearful of something called "backmasking", which, nowadays, become cliche has comedy fodder. Backmasking is the notion that if you play a song backwards, you will find some sort of subliminal messaging, usually of an unholy nature as the accusation goes. However, it turns out that not all backmasking is bad. One song that is apparently guilty of backmasking in its first seven notes, but in a good way, is the English nursery rhyme song, "London Bridge is Falling Down," which reinforces with toddlers the ever important concept of gravity. The opening line of this song, when played backwards, becomes the opening line of a melody that we hear, sing, and hum in synagogue during the High Holy Days.

"London Bridge," when sung in the key of C, spells the following notes:

GAGFEFG or Sol La Sol Fa Mi Fa Sol

The first seven notes of our High Holy Days tune, when sung in the key of C spells the following notes:

G F E F G A G or Sol Fa Mi Fa Sol La Sol.

Coincidence? Maybe. The High Holy Days melody to which I am referring is an example of something that I may have mentioned previously. It is a "MiSinai tune." Many of the tunes to which we pray in synagogue, even if we label them "traditional" or "folk" are tunes to which we can nevertheless trace back to any of a number of Jewish musicians, in the 19th, 20th, or even possibly the 21st Century, who thought the melody and then notated it down on musical staff paper. This is not the case with a MiSinai tune. A MiSinai tune is one in which we cannot trace to a specific composer, but simply got passed down orally. We therefore attribute these melodies to the momentous event in Jewish history when Moses brought the Torah down from Mount Sinai. Thus we say that the

melody came "from Sinai."

There are several MiSinai tunes but the one that I mentioned above is the only one I know of that is anagrammatic with a secular children's song. It is interesting to note, that in our musical tradition, we spend part of our holiest time of the year, the Days of Repentance, reversing a tune that specifically alludes, perhaps metaphorically, to a collapsing structure. As adults, we are sadly reminded of gravity every time we turn on the news, as it acts on not just infrastructure, but people, cherished institutions, and even society as a whole. Late night talk show hosts try to answer the question: "How did we get here (into this mess)? In real life, structures don't magically un-fall back up. That only happens in superhero movies where the rules of science don't apply. (It is probably a good thing that we don't have the ability to suddenly reverse the Earth's rotation like in Superman the Movie as that could get a bit windy). In our world, re-raising a bridge or anything else requires hard work. Abraham Joshua Heschel reminded us that prayer is only the start of that work when he said:

> "Prayer cannot bring water to parched fields, or mend a broken bridge, or rebuild a ruined city; but prayer can water an arid soul, mend a broken heart, and rebuild a weakened will."

The Hebrew word for "repentance" is "teshuvah" which means "returning." Reversing the tune could symbolize the repairing of metaphorical bridges, between each of us and ourselves, each of us and each other, and each of us and God. That requires the hard work of re-raising a metaphorical bridge. It involves going to each person and asking them for forgiveness with no guarantee of that person's answer. We hear the sound of the Shofar to remind us to get to work doing that because the bridge won't rebuild itself.

To those of you whom I may have wronged in some way this past year, please accept my humble apologies.

May 5786 be a year of responding to that alarm clock and re-raising bridges.

They along with your entire TSS family, want to know how you're doing, and if there's something we may be able to do to help you out in a difficult situation. Even if your life is going along pretty well, we'd love to know that too.

While their outreach is one way to find out how life is treating you, this process works both ways. You can reach out proactively to let us know how we can help you. We never want you to feel unseen, unheard or unloved when there's people who are ready to give you a shoulder to lean on. Please, do not hesitate to call Rabbi Uri, Carol, Sue or the Temple office to update us on anything you think we need to know, and if you are fine but know of another congregant who isn't doing well, please reach out on their behalf so that we never have to plead ignorance while any one of us may be suffering. It may not be the first benefit of membership at Sha'arey one thinks of, but it couldn't be more important.

Judaism in the Second Temple Period: From Persian Influence to Rabbinic Transformation Led by Dan Herman

Tuesday Mornings 10:00 am -11:00 am

For the past three years, the "Tuesday Morning Study Group" has been studying the development of Judaism through the First Temple period utilizing the middle section of the Tanakh known as "The Prophets". Join Professor Dan Herman as we now transition our study of Jewish history with a course on "Judaism in the Second Temple Period." From the dawn of Persian rule in 539 BCE to the seismic shifts brought by the Roman conquest and the subsequent formation of Rabbinic Judaism, we will discuss how this formative era in Jewish history connects to contemporary Jewish thought and practice.

How the political and cultural tides of the Persian and Greek empires intertwined with Jewish religious practices and identities

The Jews and Rome: Destruction of the Second Temple (63 BCE - 70 CE)


How the destruction of the Second Temple and the fall of Jerusalem catalyzed a radical transformation in Jewish thought and practice

The Beginnings of Rabbinic Judaism to 300 CE

How this pivotal period influenced Judaism and the lessons we can draw for today's Jewish community .


