From the Rabbi...

In December during the school break we took the family to Washington DC for a few days of sight seeing and family fun. It was a great little trip. We could see the Capital from our cute little Air Bnb, and despite the cold and wind we were able to have a very enjoyable time.

We went to the Natural History Museum, Air and Space, African American History Museum, saw monuments and had a tour of the Capital building with a cousin. We also had the opportunity to ride the DC Metro around town. While going up and down the escalators, in more than one station, we observed ICE agents in full gear.

It was shocking to behold. I am used to seeing soldiers on the street having lived in Israel for many years. But in America, on American streets, and in our nations capital? This was not only strange but a bit scary. Maybe more than a bit. And then in the beginning of this month we saw what

unfolded in Minneapolis and the tragic death of Renee Good. It is a heavy time in the world and in our country.

And it feels relentless.

In Jackson, Mississippi an arsonist set fire to the historic Beth Israel Congregation. Allegedly a hate crime (seems obvious), our Jewish people and institutions are under increased threat. We are spending more and more communal funds on security than ever before. Funds that used to be put towards programming and building Jewish life, are now being used to protect ourselves and survive.

What should be our response to a world that too often crushes our hearts? Is there a Jewish way to answer for a world on fire?

January often brings cold clarity. The noise of the world does not fade with the turning of the calendar, and many of us arrive to services, classes, and programs carrying real unease—about rising antisemitism, about the visibility of force and fear in public life, about what it means to be vulnerable in our own country.

The synagogue has never been a place to escape reality. It is, instead, a place where reality can be faced honestly and together. Our tradition does not ask us to be unafraid; it asks us not to be alone.

When Jews gather—to pray, to learn, to mark time—we create a refuge that is not built on denial, but on connection. Here, anxiety can be named. Here, memory steadies us. Here, we are reminded that fear does not get the final word.

In a moment when many feel watched, targeted, or unsettled, simply showing up for one another is an act of strength. Making use of our tried and true Jewish technologies of study, prayer, and acts of kindness are bold acts to banish darkness and bad feelings.

Here at TSS we know this in our bones. We know how good it is to be together. We know the value we get from our study sessions. We cherish our holiday gatherings to uplift our souls and connect us to our past, present, and future. And when we show up for our neighbors in need we satisfy our need for acting with kindness and generosity in the world. We are a great little Temple for which I am very grateful.

May this community continue to be a place of presence, courage, and care—for ourselves and for all who seek dignity and safety.

The Cantorial world, especially the community of my school, Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion-DFSSM, is saddened by the loss of a beloved teacher and mentor of ours, Cantor Robert Abelson, z"l, who passed away on January 5, 2026, at the age of 96. In addition to being a beloved husband, father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, Cantor Abelson was also a great teacher, Cantorial coach to generations of students, including myself, and he is remembered by all for his warmth and menschlichkeit. He was a master of languages, especially Yiddish, and a poet. He also had a background in Opera and often treated audiences of his to Yiddish dubbings of famous arias, notably "Largo Al Factotum" from Rossini's Barber of Seville. You can watch that here:

Cantor Abelson was born in Brooklyn in 1929 to a Polish father and Lithuanian mother. He graduated HUC in 1957 and was a continuous mentor to generations of students as a faculty member. He had served as Cantor at Temple Israel of the City of New York since 1980.

Though I did not know about his poetry, he apparently began writing it at a very young age and never stopped. A collection of his poems have been gathered in a compendium by HUC and Temple Israel called Better Than Dreaming: A Life in Poetry. In the foreword, one of its co-editors, Cantor Howard Stahl, compares Cantor Abelson to Yehuda HaLevi, Solomon Ibn Gabirol, and King David.

Judaism in the Second Temple Period: From Persian Influence to Rabbinic Transformation

Led by Dan Herman

Tuesday Mornings 10:00 am -11:00 am

For the past three years, the "Tuesday Morning Study Group" has been studying the development of Judaism through the First Temple period utilizing the middle section of the Tanakh known as "The Prophets". Join Professor Dan Herman as we now transition our study of Jewish history with a course on "Judaism in the Second Temple Period." From the dawn of Persian rule in 539 BCE to the seismic shifts brought by the Roman conquest and the subsequent formation of Rabbinic Judaism, we will discuss how this formative era in Jewish history connects to contemporary Jewish thought and practice.

Topics will include:

Persians and Greeks in Judea (539-168 BCE)

How the political and cultural tides of the Persian and Greek empires intertwined with Jewish religious practices and identities

Maccabean (Hasmonean) Rule (168-63 BCE)

How this period redefined Jewish autonomy and religious practice, setting the stage for a renewed Jewish identity

The Jews and Rome: Destruction of the Second Temple (63 BCE - 70 CE)

How the destruction of the Second Temple and the fall of Jerusalem catalyzed a radical transformation in Jewish thought and practice

The Beginnings of Rabbinic Judaism to 300 CE

How this pivotal period influenced Judaism and the lessons we can draw for today's Jewish community .

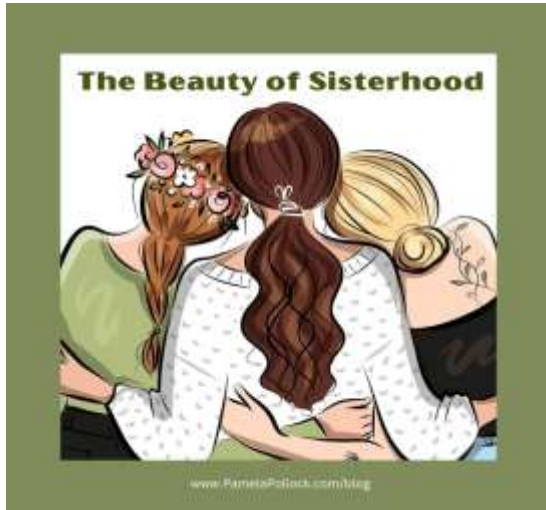
